

Why Zero? (Please Comment)

This article is intended to help examiners understand the importance of providing a rationale when determining a zero percent impairment estimate for an allowance and how best to present that rationale efficiently and effectively. Within this context, let's break down Mr. Kant's quote.

"Beginning with the senses" refers to collecting objective findings (or lack thereof) to be evaluated by the trained examiner. Objective findings are measurable and observable data that can be verified by an examiner.

"Proceeding to understanding" refers to the skilled examiner's ability to attribute, through training and experience, an association between those findings and the allowed condition(s) and to assign a degree of severity (or lack thereof). This is the impairment rating.



"Reason" can have a dual meaning. It can refer to the examiner's ability to think through to a logical conclusion (which is a must) or an explanation for the conclusion, a why. If this is not expressed unequivocally in the report, those without the same medical training, experience, and certification as the examiner are left wondering, "How did they get there? What is their logic?"

Question number two in our referral letter states, "Based on the AMA Guides, Fifth Edition, and with reference to the Industrial Commission Medical Examination Manual, provide the estimated percentage of whole person impairment arising from each allowed condition. Then, provide a combined whole-person impairment. If there is no impairment for an allowed condition, indicate 0%."

Why zero? How do I account for it? It's simple.

There are two common reasons why an allowance would be assigned a 0% impairment:

- 1. There are no objective findings of impairment due to the allowed condition at the time of the examination.
- 2. There are multiple allowances to be evaluated within one body part or body system. In this case, the AMA Guides instruct us to rate those allowances together as a group by first choosing and rating the allowance with the greatest degree of impairment and assigning 0% to the others, as they are "superseded" by the highest-rated allowance. To do otherwise would be "double dipping".

"For the allowed condition of lumbar radiculopathy, there is a 12% impairment, DRE category III, Table 15-3, page 384. All other conditions in the lumbar spine are 0%, superseded by the radiculopathy. There are no findings of impairment due to the allowed scalp laceration, which is assigned 0% impairment."
